

**RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS  
MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING  
OCTOBER 6<sup>TH</sup>, 2016  
7:00 PM**

The Medina Township Board of Trustees met in regular session at the Medina Township Hall on October 6<sup>th</sup>, 2016, to conduct the business of the Township. Chairman Ostmann called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm with the following Trustees in attendance: Bill Ostmann, Ray Jarrett and Ken DeMichael. Also in attendance were Fiscal Officer Ventura, Township Administrator DeHoff, Police Chief Arbogast, Fire Chief Crumley, Service Department Superintendent Miller and the general public.

**Roll Call**

Mr. Ostmann asked for a roll call of all members present. Trustees present were Mr. Ostmann, Mr. Jarrett and Mr. DeMichael.

**Pledge**

Mr. Ostmann led the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

**Moment of Silence**

Mr. Ostmann asked for a moment of silence for our service personnel both here and abroad and for our first responders who risk their lives every day to keep us safe.

**Presentation of Check to the MS Society**

Firefighter Mike Stopa said the Firefighters Association had their first annual golf outing fundraiser and will donate the money to the MS Society. He thanked the Friends of Medina Township in helping them with the finances and also all the donors especially Smith Brothers, Bill Doraty KIA, Medina Lighting, Don Basch Jewelers, Serve-Pro Hudson and Biegel Plumbing. He presented Janet Kramer of the National MS Society with a check totaling \$2,700.00. Ms. Kramer thanked Mr. Stopa and the Association for the donation and said every penny will be utilized to provide many services to the people with Multiple Sclerosis.

**SITE PLANS**

**Reddy Family Dentistry – 3617 Reserve Commons Drive - Site**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and approve the change of use for Reddy Family Dentistry to be located at 3617 Reserve Commons Drive as presented. Mr. DeMichael seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. DeMichael and Mr. Jarrett.

Mr. Savel, representing Dr. Reddy, said it has taken him over eight weeks to get this approval. He said it is called a change of use but it was a dental office before and it is the same use, dental. He has had the permit from the building department and health department for over thirty (30) days. He feels the process takes too long when it is the same use, dental to dental. He just wanted to bring this to the Trustees attention.

**Weymouth Crossing Subdivision – Subdivision Sign**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and deny approval of a subdivision sign for Weymouth Crossing as it does not meet the requirements of Section 605 B. – Subdivision Signs of the Medina Township Zoning Resolution regarding setback. Mr. Jarrett seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. Jarrett and Mr. DeMichael.

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and approve the new construction for Valley Storage located at 5010 Gateway Drive as presented. It was so noted that the existing landscaping on the east and south side will be increased. Mr. DeMichael seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. DeMichael and Mr. Jarrett.

**Medina Creative Café – 4080 Creative Living Way – Wall Sign**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and approve a wall sign for Medina Creative Café located at 4080 Creative Living Way not to exceed 49 square feet as presented. Mr. DeMichael seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. DeMichael and Mr. Jarrett.

**Medina Creative Café – 4080 Creative Living Way – Awning Sign**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and deny an awning sign for Medina Creative Café located at 4080 Creative Living Way as it does not meet the requirements of Section 605 I Wall, Roof and Awning Signs of the Medina Township Zoning Resolution. Mr. Jarrett seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. Jarrett and Mr. DeMichael.

**Medina County Federal Credit Union – 3303 Medina Road - Site**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and approve the change of use for Medina County Federal Credit Union to be located at 3303 Medina Road as presented. Mr. DeMichael seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. DeMichael and Mr. Jarrett.

**Medina County Federal Credit Union – 3303 Medina Road – Wall Sign**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and approve a wall sign for Medina County Federal Credit Union located at 3303 Medina Road not to exceed 60.76 square feet as presented. Mr. Jarrett seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. Jarrett and Mr. DeMichael.

**Medina County Federal Credit Union – 3303 Medina Road – New Faces on Ground Sign**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and approve new faces on the existing ground sign for Medina County Federal Credit Union located at 3303 Medina Road not to exceed 23.9 square feet as presented. Mr. DeMichael seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. DeMichael and Mr. Jarrett.

**Medina County Federal Credit Union – 3303 Medina Road – Directional Sign**

Mr. Ostmann motioned to accept the recommendation of the Zoning Commission and approve a directional sign for Medina County Federal Credit Union located at 3303 Medina Road not to exceed 3.75 square feet as presented. Mr. Jarrett seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr., Jarrett and Mr. DeMichael.

**Presentation by the Life Support Team**

Mr. Ostmann said the Trustees have voted to put an Ambulance/EMS levy on the ballot to help finance our Life Support Team. We have to renew our levy and increase it (because of rising medical costs). LST Director Mark Phillips and Cleveland Clinic Chief Operating Officer Vicki Snyder gave a power point presentation (see attached) and answered questions from those in attendance. Mr. Phillips said LST services Medina Township, Medina City and Montville Township and it has been a good partnership for the last forty (40) years. Response times from Station One (Reagan Pkwy), which is the main medic and serves the western area of the Township, has an average of 5.65 minutes. Station Four is at Medina Hospital and serves the eastern side and Interstate 71 of the Township and the average response time is 5.59 minutes. Station five is the medic unit stationed in Montville Township and the average response time is 7.47 minutes. This is for the first six months of 2016. The Montville station has the fewest number of calls.

A priority dispatch system was implemented a few years ago and helps to determine what type of emergency call it is. This helps LST to downgrade a number of calls to non-emergency which has reduced the number of lights and siren calls to 40% making it safer for those on the road and it has no detrimental effect to the patient and has not affected our overall response time. It is a resource allocation to divert from a low priority call to a high priority call and also identifies frequent users of the service, people that call on a regular basis that may have issues that can be handled socially or through mental health. It allows us to implement a single paramedic response unit for the low priority calls as well.

**Presentation by the Life Support Team Con't**

Gary Vene asked if the 2,004 runs they responded to were all medical emergencies. Mr. Phillips said the 2,004 included all runs. Mr. Phillips said they do not go to alarm drops except for medical alarms. Chief Crumley said LST does respond to the Masonic Home and Medina schools. Mr. Phillips said LST does go to public buildings and that would be included in that total. Mr. Vene asked how many of the 2,004 runs were medical runs. Mr. Phillips said the vast majority of them are medical but he doesn't have the exact number. Mr. Phillips said one of the reasons for the priority dispatch was for the non-emergency type requests for services which have greatly increased, not only in Medina but around the country, people call 911 when they run out of options. LST frequently gets calls for things that are not real medical emergencies but they all count as calls. Mr. Phillips said we have to respond but the way we respond is different. If it's low priority we may send one paramedic to the call. An ambulance costs \$200,000.00 with no equipment on it so rather than send that to a call when it is not required, it makes more sense to send the appropriate resource. We cannot buy more ambulances and hire more paramedics just because the call volume has increased. Mr. Phillips said unless they transport someone they cannot recover those costs because there is no one to bill. Gary Vene asked what they do with their frequent flyers and Mr. Phillips said there are programs they are putting in place and they work with the person's physicians, the hospital, and alternative paths has helped by giving them a number they can call for counseling instead of 911. Chief Crumley asked how many times Station 5 had to respond to Medina Township and what the response time was. Mr. Phillips said he did not have that information but the response time could be 10 minutes. Mr. Phillips said when the other 2 medics are out they move the Montville medic to station 3 to improve response time and we constantly monitor what is going on throughout the area.

Vicki Snyder explained that the hospital handles the billing and the municipalities pay based on their percentage. That is one part of the billing. The other part of the cost recovery piece is billing the patient. In health care nowadays it is becoming very complicated and what the Trustees have noticed is the fluctuation of patient collection percentage. It fluctuates quite a bit from month to month and has eroded over time. We charge everyone the same for Medicare regardless of their insurance but the amount we get back from the insurance is actually different depending on what insurance you are billing. Medicare pays us \$266.00 and then we are told to bill the patient \$70.00. So at the end of the day, if you can collect the \$70.00 from the patient, you end up with a collection percentage of about 71%. Anthem Senior is Medicare also and it is another plan the patient can use but their insurance payment is \$73.08 and when all is said and done you only get 36%. Depending on what type of patient you have, you can collect a different percentage of the total dollars. Commercial insurance has a higher collection rate and it mirrors Medicare. What Medicaid pays is \$84.00 so you collect 18%. If you look at what the Medicaid expansion has done in Ohio, it has given folks insurance on the Medicaid side but when you bill, that is all you get paid. The LST and the hospital setting are experiencing the reduction in reimbursement from insurance companies because we are trying to reduce the cost of health care. That is why the reimbursement rate fluctuates. Joyce Preuss-Broadway, 330-721-5113, will help people with their billing. Ms. Snyder said there is a downward trend on reimbursements and more of the financial responsibility is being shifted to the community and that becomes a problem when the community is paying taxes to help support the services. Mr. Phillips said the numbers are presented at the LST quarterly meetings. Mrs. Strogan asked if they are getting the co-pays some insurances are requiring and Ms. Snyder said yes we are collecting the co-pays but they are harder to get from the patient than from the insurance companies so that will cause the percentage to go down. Mrs. Gardner said her insurance has been billed \$150,000.00 by the Clinic and the insurance company has not reimbursed the clinic for maybe one third of that and that she was responsible for about \$4,000.00. Ms. Snyder said it is the state of health care right now until we figure out how to respond to the affordable health care act. Mrs. Ventura asked what the price of a call is if LST doesn't transport. Ms. Snyder said they don't look at it that way, they look at it as coverage so she really doesn't know what the price is per call. Mr. Jarrett said it is about \$509.00 for basic life support. Ms. Snyder said they are getting more calls from people who need assistance. Health care is about to reinvent itself on how to manage more people with less money. The Sprint Unit is part of having a low cost way of sending someone out to help when it is not a high emergency. Mr. Phillips said it is the first phase of the community para-medicine where people can stay at home and not have to go to the hospital and they can also follow up when people are discharged from the hospital to keep them from being readmitted, which is costly and those are the things that are in the process right now. He also said that with the changes in health care there is an incentive to make sure people who are discharged from the hospital get their medications, get followed up on and they get to their doctor's appointments so they don't have to return to the hospital to be readmitted. Mr. DeMichael asked if they are able to bill for the para-medic concept. Mr. Phillips said not yet but the experts are saying that it is the wave of the future and everyone is confident that there is going to be a model for reimbursement. Mr. DeMichael asked if there was anything we could do and Mr. Phillips said the incentive is on the hospital side because if someone is readmitted it becomes very costly.

Presentation by the Life Support Team Con't

Ms. Snyder said that Medicare actually penalizes you if the patient goes home with a cardiac issue and has shortness of breath or falls down the stairs and breaks an ankle; it then comes back on the hospital even though they are not related and it is still free care for the patient. Mr. DeMichael asked if it was 30 days readmission. Ms. Snyder said it is 30 days readmission now and there are others as they continue to roll out the affordable care act and get through all those pages of regulations. It is to raise the quality of care but it is cumbersome to try to care for a population when you only get paid for the stuff you do. The payment hasn't caught up to the government's vision to do some of these things, the tele-medicine and the community paramedic which makes sense to do but there is no reimbursement to even get that started. Mr. DeMichael asked if there are grants for that. Mr. Phillips said he hasn't seen any. Ms. Snyder said Fairview Hospital has the same issue. Mark Radice asked how the Sprint Unit benefits our township because we run EMS during the day and we basically provide that same service in a collaborative department. Mr. Radice said we are told LST is running at a deficit right now so that Sprint Unit brought another head count on to LST and is divided among the communities. If we are running at a deficit that should have been brought up at a Board meeting and voted on and can we evaluate where the money is going. We are putting a levy on because we are running at a deficit. Mr. Phillips said that becomes operations and the Board is not involved in operations. Mr. Radice commented that we have no say in how our money is being spent. Ms. Snyder said we actually present to the Board what we are doing and thinking. Mr. Radice said because you guys are duplicating a service that we have been offering for I don't know, how many years Chief? Chief Crumley said three (3) maybe four (4) years. Mr. Radice said we have a first responder unit. Mr. Phillips said the difference is we cover three (3) communities and the benefit of the Sprint Unit is that it keeps one of the full paramedic units available for your township. Mr. Radice stated that if it is an increase cost and we are now exceeding what our levy's brought in I would think we should have a means to say yes or no. Mr. Phillips said that Mr. Radice is assuming that that one unit is what's increased the Townships cost and he disagreed with that. Mr. Radice feels it is a good chunk of it. Ms. Snyder said she sees his point but the Trustees come in quarterly and we go over all the expenses with LST. Mr. Radice said all he hears is that we don't know how LST charges. Mr. Phillips said that is why they came to the meeting to help everyone understand. Mr. Phillips said his one slide showed the percentages are actually lower this year in the first six months then it was a year ago so our costs should be lower. Vicki can tell you that our budgets that have been presented to the Board every quarter were under budget. We are not over budget. Mr. Radice asked if they consider what our levy brings in. Mr. Phillips said absolutely. Mr. Radice said that is what he is getting at. Mr. Phillips said the finance director at the hospital reviews what the levies have when we do our year end budget to protect our partners to make sure we don't show up with a budget that says we don't bring in that money. Mr. Radice said they are being told that is what is draining the budget. Ms. Snyder said we have pulled back expenses to make sure we don't go over *inaudible*. Mr. Phillips said we held off buying an ambulance for a year to help support this Township because of the money that's coming in. Ms. Snyder said we do have those open discussions. Mr. Phillips said we don't go into the day to day operations with the Board, we do a summary in a little more detail then we did tonight. Mr. Radice said, if we have a budget bringing in \$400,000.00, that is what you are basing what you are going to collect from us so we shouldn't be exceeding that. Mr. Phillips said one thing that's changed is reimbursements. Some years we have brought in a lot more than we thought we would and then the last couple of years it has been a little tight. Mr. Radice asked if that was carryover on the township's side. Ms. Snyder said, what they are trying to say is, because we don't necessarily know the exact amount of the levy money that's coming in we present the budget, the Trustees look at it and approve it at the beginning of the year for the Life Support Team and as Mr. Phillips said, we are under budget. One of the challenges that we are having is the billing piece but that is because of the state of the health care. But as far as taking what your levy income is and then doing our budget against that, the Trustees are sitting there in that governmental meeting to make that decision. Mr. Radice said, so in theory, we should not be running at a deficit. Mr. DeMichael asked Mr. Radice how he was surmising that. Mr. Radice said that is what he's hearing. Mr. DeMichael said no, you are hearing that they are collecting less from the insurance. Mr. Radice said they are basing their budget on our levy. Ms. Snyder said no, we don't base our budget on what the levy brings in, we base our budget on what operations are and the Trustees look over that. Mr. Phillips said the Trustees then bring it back to their individual entity, whether it is City Council or Township Trustees, meeting to vote on it or get it approved and then report back to us. Mr. DeMichael said he has numbers that say we have collected less this year, or in 2016, we are projected to collect less than in 2009, so we are collecting less. Mr. DeMichael said it is not a substantial amount but that's ....Chief Crumley asked what the Trustees are looking at projecting the budget this year. Mr. DeMichael said \$323,000.00. Chief Crumley asked if that was from the levy and Mr. Jarrett said yes. Mrs. Ventura asked if the levy was collecting less and was told yes. Mr. DeMichael said he has tried to get to the bottom of that with the Auditor's office, the taxes are going up and it is also how the levy was written, it should be a pretty flat constant number and it is close but, even in 2011 and 2012 it was \$332,000.00.

**Presentation by the Life Support Team Con't**

Mr. Jarrett said he thinks that has been the highest and Mr. DeMichael agreed with him. Mr. Phillips said if it is a renewal levy you are going to collect less than a replacement levy. Mr. DeMichael said you are also paying less per household. Mr. Phillips said over time if you keep renewing every five years, as they do in the City, it brings in less money than it did when it was first put on the ballot. The only way to get the full value on that is to put a replacement on to get it back to its original millage rate. Mr. Phillips said what we collect from insurance is subtracted from your Township bill so the better the collections the better it is for the Township. If collections are down then there is more out of pocket for the Township to cover that difference. So when we have had really good collections everybody benefits from that. There was a time when we were collecting a million dollars a year, that makes the service a million dollars less expensive for the residents because it was subsidized by the insurance. Robin Gray asked who transports the patient from Medina Hospital to another Hospital when LST is not used. Mr. Phillip's said the patient is transported by private ambulance. She asked if the Cleveland Clinic has their own ambulance service for regular transportation. Mr. Phillips said no hospital has their own ambulance service. Ms. Snyder said the hospital will sub-contract with a private ambulance service but we do not own the ambulances. Ms. Gray asked if we sub-contract LST and Ms. Snyder said no. Ms. Gray asked if a large portion of the payment is overtime for the paramedics. Mr. Phillips said no. Mr. Radice asked if anyone came and addressed that we are running at a deficit and to find a way to cut costs in the Township. Mr. Phillips said not in those exact words but in the past three four years, at all of our board meetings, we have actually presented to not only your Trustees but the other elected officials, cost reduction incentives, promotions that we have done in the department and throughout the hospital. Mr. Phillips said no, not specifically. Mr. Jarrett said he had to interject and stated that he did bring it up that we were running over past our levy and at the last board meeting there was confusion among the entities how things were, the way it was dictated on whether it was a billable run or a non-billable run. Mr. Phillips acknowledged that Ray was correct. Mr. Phillips thought Mr. Radice wanted to know if he was asked personally and he had not been asked personally. Ms. Gray asked who makes the determination if it is billable or non-billable. Ms. Snyder said the insurance companies. Mr. Phillips said we cannot bill unless we transport. Ms. Snyder said even if you transport there's a lot of times the insurance thinks it wasn't medically necessary. Mr. Phillips said it is a Medicare rule that you can't charge unless you transport someone. Someone asked if the Sprint Unit sees a lot of down time. Mr. Phillips said no it is the busiest unit they have. Chief Crumley asked if the Sprint Unit goes on every call and if the ambulance is needed then they are called. Ms. Gray asked what a Sprint Unit is. Mr. Phillips said it is a single paramedic fully equipped as an ambulance but it cannot transport. Ms. Gray asked who absorbs that cost. Mr. Phillips said that is part of the service. Mrs. Gardner said frequently that goes out and you don't call for the ambulance which saves an ambulance call. Mr. Phillips said it does not change your percentage. What it does is make your non-billable calls cheaper. Mr. Jarrett asked how long the Sprint Unit has been in operation. Mr. Phillips said it went into full operation at the beginning of this year. They did it on a temporary basis last year to test some things out and to this day they are making some changes to manage resources. Ms. Gray asked if the cost is divided into thirds and Mr. Phillips said it is based on calls. Mr. Ostmann asked where that unit is stationed. Mr. Phillips said at the hospital. Mrs. Gardner said one of the biggest problems is that you are not getting reimbursed for every ambulance trip equally from the different insurers or the different entities who are paying for that service and so the hospital and the ambulance service is not getting reimbursed for their services. Ms. Snyder said that is the trend you are seeing because the government pay which includes the plans on the exchange that are paying between the Medicare and Medicaid level. You can see the commercial insurance is going away and it is lowering the cost of health care and everybody is paying less and there are more patients in the system. Mr. Radice asked what are base is. Ms. Snyder said the bills are sorted back to each township. Mr. Jarrett said it is 56%. Trustees were asking why it fluctuated so much. She said it depends on what mix you get and how successful you are in collecting that from the patient. Mr. Radice asked if the Township is 56% on every dollar you are collecting. Ms. Snyder said she doesn't have the answer off the top of her head. Mr. Jarrett asked how many insurance companies does the Hospital billing work with and he was told it was well over 1600. Mr. Radice said right, but we would want to know the overall number that we are getting back from all of them. Ms. Snyder said the dynamic in the insurance market that is paying the bills for the patient is changing and back to Medicaid expansion you've got Medicaid patients and this is the first time they have insurance and they are using that insurance. It pays a lot less than anything else. Also, the seniors taking managed care plans, which makes sense, because they can tailor their plan to what they need as an individual, which is a good thing, but it also wreaks havoc because they don't pay for ambulance service but they pay more for some other service so that is where you get the variability on plans which makes it hard to predict what you are going to get paid from insurance companies. Mr. Radice asked if we know what we have outstanding. Ms. Snyder said that information can be gotten from Joyce. Mr. Ostmann said our levy is bringing in a certain amount of money and this year it is going to cost about \$96,000.00 more than what our levy is bringing in but, the Township is not running in deficit.

**Presentation by the Life Support Team Con't**

Mr. Ostmann asked how many paramedics are on each squad. Mr. Phillips said two per squad and one on the Sprint Unit. The Sprint Unit is staffed 7am to 5pm Monday through Friday for a total of fifty hours per week. Mr. Ostmann asked if they have mutual aid agreements with everybody and Mr. Phillips said yes. Mr. Ostmann asked how often LST goes on mutual aid calls and how often is that reciprocated. Mr. Phillips said we go on more mutual aid calls then is reciprocated. We don't call for mutual aid more than 5 or 6 times a year in the entire service area out of 4,000 calls. Mr. Ostmann asked if they have mutual agreements with Lafayette and Mr. Phillips said we have 3 to 6 mutual aids a month to other communities as opposed to. ...Mr. Ostmann asked who gets billed for those. The agreement in the county is we can bill for them. If we were to call mutual aid to the Township from Brunswick or Brunswick Hills they are allowed to bill for that service. Mr. Ostmann asked if all his employees are Paramedics and Mr. Phillips said yes. Mr. Ostmann asked if regular education is required and Mr. Phillips said yes, they do ongoing continuing education. They are required to do so many hours a year and they do online training. They also have monthly run reviews with their medical director. Mr. Ostmann asked how many total employees LST has. Mr. Phillips said thirty- six which includes Joyce who does the billing, twenty-two full-time and the rest is PRN which means they only work when needed which helps alleviate overtime. Chief Crumley said LST has three squads, two medics per squad and 1 Sprint Unit during the day, Monday through Friday. Chief Crumley asked what their approved budget was for this year and is it at least two million dollars and if it is our part is 20%. Mr. Phillips said it's not about how many times the ambulance comes into the township because there is a lot more to take into consideration then just the vehicle. Mrs. Strogin asked what benefits Medina Hospital is giving back to the Township. Mr. Phillips said there is a long list of benefits the Townships and the LST is getting from the hospital at no cost to the residents; training, education, legal counsel, computers, etc. Mr. Phillips said if anyone in the community has questions please call the hospital and we will answer any questions. **Supplemental Appropriation Changes**

The LST Advisory Board decided at that time to have a consensus to have agreements with each different entity that we could pay Carlson Funeral Homes to transport that individual.

Mr. Jarrett motioned and read the document that Carlson Funeral Home presented to Medina Township (see attached). Mr. Ostmann seconded the motion. Mr. Jarrett said we have indigents that have passed away and there is no family. Chief Arbogast said Carlson Funeral Homes does an outstanding service of removing the deceased in a timely manner. If the person is deceased at the scene, LST will not transport because if they are transported to a morgue then there is an ER charge because they have to go through the ER. If they are deceased at the house it then becomes a coroner's case and he has to release the body. Body bags are specially designed and they are heavy duty and Carlson's has not been charging for them. Mr. Ostmann asked how often this service was used this year and Chief Arbogast said there have been a number of heroin deaths and he doesn't have the exact number. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Jarrett, Mr. Ostmann and Mr. DeMichael.

**PUBLIC COMMENT**

Chief Arbogast said family is contacted and they have the choice of what funeral home to use. Carlson is used when there is no other choice and the deceased cannot be left where they passed.

Sally Gardner (3333 Foskett Road) said when her Mother passed away she was contacted and asked what funeral home she wanted to use. This Saturday is the fall hazardous waste collection day for the County at the fairgrounds and the Brunswick Service Center.

Mark Radice (4036 Stonegate Drive) said it sounded like the LST budget was \$2 million so our percentage of that is \$400,000.00 and we collected \$300,000.00. Mr. DeMichael said it wasn't determined that it was \$2 million. Mr. Jarrett said it was a little over \$2 million. Mr. Radice said we would need to make up \$100,000.00 in collections and you are projecting \$90,000.00 that means they are not collecting anything and it doesn't make sense that we are running at a deficit. Mr. Jarrett said if the operation is this amount and they are only collecting this amount and we are only bringing in so much. Mrs. DeHoff said when we figured out the deficit figure we took what we have had to pay them for the past six (6) months and then you divide that out and this is how we had to pay them and project that out for the rest of the year and that is depending on how much we are billed for the rest of the year..

Mr. Ostmann motioned to close the floor for public comment. Mr. Jarrett seconded the motion. Voting aye thereon: Mr. Ostmann, Mr. Jarrett and Mr. DeMichael.

**Executive Session for Property Acquisition**

Mr. Ostmann tabled the Executive Session for land acquisition.

Mr. Jarrett motioned to go into Executive Session with the Board of Trustees, Fire Chief and Police Chief for employee discipline. Mr. DeMichael seconded the motion. 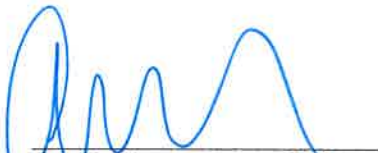

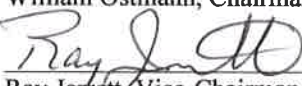
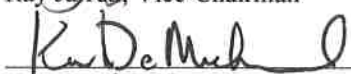
